Fly Line Leader

The fly-fishing leader and tippet are what provides a nearly invisible transition from the fly line to the fly. The fly-fishing leader and tippet come in a wide variety of shapes, sizes, materials, and even colours. The first main purpose of the leader and tippet is to connect your fly line to the flies that you are trying to present to the fish. The second main purpose of the leader and tippet is to complete the transfer of energy from the fly line to the fly so that your line rolls over and straightens itself out in a relatively straight line.

Leader:

The leader is the material that is connected to the end of your fly line. There are 3 different types of monofilament leaders, and I have deliberately omitted the braided leaders and twisted mono leaders.

- (a) Level Leaders: A length of monofilament that is the same strength diameter from fly line to tippet. This works well with the wind behind it but will collapse when casting into it.
- (b) Tapered Leader:
 - Knotless: A commercially made monofilament of varied length to suit the type of fishing and conditions. It is best to find one with a butt diameter of almost 2/3 the thickness of the fly line tip. Continuous changing of flies reduces the tippet length which means you will need to add a section of tippet material to suit. Also, an opportunity to add a tippet ring.
 - Knotted: This is one that is tied by yourself with monofilaments of varied diameters based on several formulae – such as Gibson, Ritz, Orvis or Borger. All formulae can be found online.

In my early years I adopted the Ritz leader formula and now use the easier Gibson one. This is created by using the simple formula of 1/3 butt, 1/3 taper and 1/3 tippet the leader length can be whatever you desire., depending on conditions and water fished. The end of the butt must still be 2/3 the thickness of the fly line tip. The taper section will also be divided into 3 equal sections. The butt and taper section are best made with a stiff leader material as they handle windy conditions better than the more supple materials. If the tippet section is made with a more supple material, it better balances the leader and provides a more delicate presentation of the dry fly.

Leader Materials:

There are 2 main types of materials used for leader and tippet – monofilament and fluorocar-

bon. Monofilament has more stretch and cheaper than fluorocarbon and it also floats on the water easier. Fluorocarbon has more sensitivity and stronger hooksets. It also sinks faster in the water, more durable, abrasion resistant and near invisible to the fish. However, fluorocarbon is more susceptible to your knots breaking and requires proper lubrication when tying your knots. I use the monofilament for the butt and taper sections and fluorocarbon for the tippet section.

The 'X' system:

When buying a spool of tippet material or a manufactured tapered leader each is designated with an 'X' rating. The typical range is from 03X down to 8X, with 03X being the thickest and strongest and 8X being the thinnest and lightest. An easy way to determine what 'X' rating to use is to divide the size of fly used by 3 to yield the approximate tippet size. That is if you are using a size 12 fly when divided by 3 yields 4, that is a 4X tippet size. Preferential decisions occur when the resultant figure does not yield a proper result. That is a size 14 hook divided by 3 gives 4.6667 which could be a 4X or 5X.

The basic chart is listed below and only between 1X to 8X.

The Grey Duster

Background:

The **Grey Duster fly** is a classic dry fly pattern that has been a favourite among fly anglers for decades. I first became aware of it when fishing with Peter Hazelwood. He used it regularly on Arthurs Lake.

Originally designed as a stillwater midge imitation but has proven to be highly effective for catching trout and grayling in various waters, especially in Wales.

The fly is known for its simplicity and effectiveness. It typically features a body made from rabbit underfur, a hackle from a badger cock feather, and sometimes a tail made from badger cock fibres.

This fly has a long history of success on rivers like the Dee, Eden, Ribble, and Wharfe, and it continues to be a go-to pattern for many anglers. Its ability to imitate midges and other small insects makes it a versatile choice for various fishing conditions. Using different sizes it can be fished throughout the entire season.

The Grey Duster can be tied in different styles, including the classic and parachute versions, each with slight variations in tying techniques.

The Tie

Hook 'Hends' BI 354 #8 - #14

Thread Grey or Black

Tail (Optional) Badger cock hackle fibres

Body Dubbed grey rabbit underfur

Hackle Badger cock saddle feather

Process

- 1. Set the hook in the vice and lay down a bed of thread.
- 2. Tie in the tail (shank length) 4 or 5 fibres.
- 3. Dub on a tapered body stopping 1/3 the length from where the thread started.
- 4. Select a feather that has fibres 1.5x the length of the hook gape.
- 5. Strip off some base fibres to provide a clean tie-in point.
- 6. Tie in the hackle with the glossy side facing upwards and 45 degrees to the hook shank.
- 7. Wind the hackle forward towards the hook eye and secure with the thread.

- 8. Clip off the waste hackle and form the head with thread.
- 9. Whip finish and varnish.

Guest Speaker:

The President introduced Gary France (AAT's Chair) to the group. His presentation will be on the insect study on shallow waters particularly Penstock Lagoon.

Prior to his presentation Gary outlined the role that AAT has within the Tasmanian fishery and was pleased to announce that they have received more funding. The webcams that were once funded by anglers are now free to the public.

With assistance from scientific experts, Hydro Tas, IFS and MAST a comprehensive study was done at Penstock Lagoon. This includes the sampling of macroinvertebrates, water testing for sediments and pollution, and the impact of boating in shallow waters.

They concluded that the causes here are due to global climate change, habitat degradation, ecological stressors and predation.

Their recommendations are to improve the marking of the boating corridor, extend the 'no boating area' and manipulate the water levels during summer. They will also undertake further studies using the last data as a baseline.

Following a series of questions, the President along with the members present thanked Gary for his presentation.


